CARIBOO HISTORY TOUR - TO THE GOLDFIELDS

Special Note: The \$100 per person charge for this course covers the cost of bus rental, fuel, driver's wages, and insurance. A lunch will be arranged each day at a restaurant along the way. Cost will be about \$12.00. You can choose to order lunch or bring your own bag lunch. Washrooms may be few and far between. Dress appropriately for the weather, bring a camera, and come prepared to learn about some forgotten history of the area.

Course Description: This tour involves three full days of history and exploration. Day 1 takes us out the Horsefly Road, through Miocene, Ochilree, Halfway, and to Harpers Camp (Horsefly), where the Cariboo Gold Rush began. We will spend a good part of the afternoon in the Horsefly Museum, and, if the salmon are running, we'll check out the fish spawning channels. Day 2 will see us following the old gold rush trail (now the Likely Road) to Big Lake, the Bullion Pit, Likely, and Quesnel Forks. On Day 3, we will explore beyond Quesnel Forks out to Keithly Creek and the start of the trail over Yanks Peak. That afternoon, we'll check out the neat little Likely Museum and learn about the second Cariboo Gold Rush at Cedar Creek. There'll be lots of stories, lots of history, and you can see where it all happened over 150 years ago.

Course Leader: Barry Sale is a retired school administrator who actually was a math and science instructor when he was teaching. However, during his time

as Principal of 150 Mile Elementary School, he became involved in the refurbishing of the "Little Red Schoolhouse" and he was badly bitten by the history bug. Barry is the current chairperson of the Elder College Curriculum Committee, and usually finds time to lead a Cariboo Tour in the fall of each semester.

AN HISTORICAL WALK THROUGH THE DAIRYFIELDS

Course Description: This walk will explore the fascinating but little known history of the area now known as The Dairyfields in Williams Lake. Evidence of human occupation in that area goes back more than 4000 years. Although few artifacts of earlier times can be readily seen, written and photographic evidence tells of First Nations occupation, the fur trade, and a regionally important colonial settlement that was one of the first in the Interior of British Columbia. The walk is approximately 4 Kms in total, and participants should bring water and a lunch. Wear good walking shoes and be prepared for the weather.

Course Leader: Ordell Steen came to Williams Lake in 1982 and worked for the Ministry of Forests as a research ecologist until 2003, and then as private consultant. Now retired, he has more time to pursue interests in natural history and the early history of Williams Lake and area. He remains active in the Williams Lake Field Naturalists and The Friends of Churn Creek Protected Area Society and is a past member of The Williams Lake Heritage Advisory Committee. In 2012 he co-authored a guide to

The Williams Lake River Valley entitled, “Stepping Into Nature.”

INTRODUCTION TO RUG HOOKING

Special Note: Bring small sharp scissors, notebook, and pen.

Course Description: This class will focus on the kit included with the materials supplied. The participants will complete a personal mug mat. We will have a short discussion about rug hooking origins, pattern designs and foundations, use of yarn, and different fabrics, new and recycled. We will also learn how to source materials for future projects. No artistic skills are needed for this course.

Course Leader: Sharon Harvey started rug hooking in 2004, mainly using quilting fabrics. She joined a group that had two certified teachers and other artists. Within two years, the group had taken in 15 different courses. Sharon learned that one didn’t need artistic skills to design and hook one’s own work. She moved to Williams Lake in 2008, where she has taught rug hooking at a local quilt shop as well as given private lessons. Over the next few years, Sharon hopes to teach using more recycled fabrics and to do more advanced work.

INTRODUCTION TO GENEALOGY

Course Description: Were your ancestors saints, sinners, seafarers or senators? It’s always interesting to trace our family histories. In this course, participants will learn how to research their family tree. We will look at how to get started, how to gather and sort information, how to obtain and print resources, and how to use online resources effectively. It’s an introductory course designed to answer many questions and to provide you with the basics you will need.

Course Leader: Phyllis Galloway has been involved in Genealogical studies for almost 40 years. She has

organized genealogy groups in both Canada and the U.S. through her involvement with the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints. Phyllis is knowledgeable about all aspects of the research techniques used to study family origins and connections. She will provide a great deal of information to help both beginners and intermediates to research their family trees.

Bob Osmachenko is a retired forester, who worked with the B.C. Ministry of Forests for 31 years in the Kootenay and Cariboo regions. Since taking the plunge into life after work, he has become involved with Toastmasters, Genealogy, and Golf. Bob is also the current Vice President of our Elder College.

COMPUTERS – THE NEXT STEPS

Course Description: This course is **not** an introductory course. It is intended for people who know their way around a computer, but who wish to expand their computer knowledge. We will use the Elder College computers so that we are all using the same format. The first class will be a “Getting Started” session to familiarize participants with Windows 10, to see what level everyone is at, and to introduce people to the E.C. Computers. As well, a survey will be done to see what topics participants want to see covered. The remaining 5 sessions will then be hands on, practical learning which could cover, but not be limited to: copying and pasting, working with files and folders, safely downloading programs and software, setting up various program features, computer security, using short cuts, using memory sticks, burning images/data to a C/D, social media, Skype, and other apps.

This will be a student driven course. Come along and ask questions and to find out about what the computer can really do. Participants will be encouraged to share their knowledge of particular areas with the rest of the class.

Course Leader: Dolores Vickers has a Certificate in Computer Information Systems and Associate Diploma in Accounting (College of New Caledonia) as well as a Provincial Instructor’s Diploma (Vancouver Community College). She has taught computerized accounting, bookkeeping, and several office practice courses at TRU. She lived in Williams Lake for 35 years, then moved to Prince George for 7. She returned to the Laketown in December of 2017 and has become active with seniors groups here. We are pleased that Dolores has volunteered to become an Elder College instructor.

Course Description: This semester we have updated our Android course to focus on the areas which the class members want to explore. There will be 6 sessions, the content of which will depend upon the interest and requests of the participants. To start with, however, the first class will be a "Getting Started" session, where you will learn a little about your device-how to make it work, vocabulary, swiping, tapping, security, in general getting to know your device and what it can do. A survey will be taken as well to see what areas class members want to learn about. Depending upon this survey, you may look at emails, social media, accessing and searching the web, photos, music and videos, and finding and using apps. It is hoped that the course will be student driven and provide you with some solid practical knowledge. We also hope that participants will share their expertise and experience with other class members.

Course Description: In this course participants will delve into the Canadian Justice System and how it operates. They will explore criminal law offences, defenses, and criminal procedures, including the rights and obligations of an accused person. Opportunities will be provided to check their understandings by applying legal principles to actual cases. A great introductory class for all those would be legal experts.

Course Leader(s): Rod and Sandra Hawkins. Rod opened and ran the Legal Aid Office in Williams Lake from 1975-1991. In 1992 he joined the Crown Counsel Office and supervised prosecutions until 2012. Since retiring, Rod has served as a legal advisor to the Williams Lake Community Council for Restorative Justice and Sandra is a facilitator of Community Justice and trainer of facilitators for the group.

Sandra Hawkins taught English and Law at the Senior Secondary level for many years. She was instrumental in starting up a restorative justice model for students in the school system, and in 1997, with the cooperation of the RCMP and members of the legal system, she helped begin the process for our community. Since then it has expanded, with some 30 facilitators taking on 60-80 cases each year. Sandra continues to be Community Justice Forum Facilitator and also a Facilitator trainer. Currently, she serves as a co-chairperson of the Williams Lake group.

Course Description: In this unique two session crafts course, Beatrix will demonstrate the Japanese method of paper making, using local organic materials including gladiola leaves, local grasses, and if available, a wasp nest. After the paper is made, it will then be used to cover a book. The course takes 2 hours in the morning and approximately 2 ½ hours in the afternoon, so plan to bring a lunch or make appropriate arrangements. This should be an interesting and unusual course.

Course Description: Participants will have the opportunity to look through a number of different telescopes, including solar, reflector and refractor. We will learn about constellations, galaxies, Messier objects and the moon, and observe these if the skies are clear. If we are clouded out there will be a session on constellations and meteorites. Binocular viewing will be discussed. Participants should bring warm clothes, and may bring their own telescopes and binoculars. A possible 3rd session for viewing will be discussed.

Course Description: This course will teach the participants the basic steps involved in reupholstering a small piece of furniture (e.g. small armless chairs, footstools, dining chairs, and some automotive seats, etc.). Each participant will be expected to bring along a small item to work on, and to provide his/her own tools (a list of supplies that you will need to bring will be available on registration day). The instructor will demonstrate the technique involved in laying and measuring fabric, cutting to size, and recovering the piece of furniture. This course is not designed for those who wish to take on a large reupholstery project.

Over the years, he has repaired, recovered, refurbished, and reconditioned virtually every type of furniture you can imagine. FELDENKRAIS METHOD – AWARENESS THROUGH MOVEMENT

Course Description: The Feldenkrais Method uses slow, gentle movement sequences to maximize skeletal movement, change old habits, and learn to move more easily. The "Awareness through Movement" lessons will guide you through movements that explore daily

physical actions such as reaching, turning, breathing, sitting, standing, and walking. These are mild, easy exercises that are particularly well suited to elders.

Course Description: This is a 2 session course for anyone interested in the effects of dementia on patients, families, and caregivers; and how to deal with the associated challenges. Keith will begin with a clinical overview of Dementia and Alzheimers, how they are recognized and diagnosed, and what assessment tools are currently used. He will spend time on the challenges involved with caring for patients and how to manage for specific concerns. He will look at recovering the patient's personhood, and rediscovering the person's soul, as well as caring for the caregivers. This will be a valuable course for those who have a loved one on the dementia spectrum and who are looking for current information and coping strategies.

Course Leader: **Rev. Dr. Keith Dobyns** has just retired as an Anglican Priest serving several Cariboo Churches along with his wife in a joint ministry arrangement. His first career in medicine included 12 years of suburban family medicine focused on geriatrics, especially dementia care. He also graduated from a Quaker seminary, trained as a chaplain and pastoral counselor, and for several years coordinated a curriculum in spirituality, ethics, and humanities for physicians in training.
