To encourage their ongoing survival and to support other important native pollinators in our region there are some well researched garden and habitat strategies that all of us can create and share. Come and discover how clever these social insects really are, and what a key role they play in keeping us fed and our ecosystems humming along.

Course Leader: Diane Dunaway has kept honey bees for over 25 years. A Master Beekeeper and retired Apiary Inspector, she has run up to 100 colonies from her Bee Happy Honey Farm in the Soda Creek Valley. Diane enjoys creating habitat for many beneficial winged creatures. When she's not off chasing swarms around the countryside she can be found at home with her husband, Dave, of 30 plus years and their menagerie of rescue animals.

Course Description: This is a two session course. The first session will be in a formal setting and will cover information about water in the Williams Lake area, including groundwater, the Region's aquifer, and how contaminates enter the watershed. There will be good opportunities for questions and answers. The second session will be a tour of the City's water system to see how Williams Lake obtains its water supply and what treatments are necessary to keep it safe for residents. This will be an interesting course on a resource we often take for granted. (The field trip may be subject to City Covid protocols.)

Course Leader: Jenny Howell is the Executive Director of the Cariboo Chilcotin Conservation Society and an instructor for the Water Wise program. She teaches water stewardship courses at many schools in the Cariboo Chilcotin. These courses include discussions and demonstrations about watershed health, conservation practices, the importance of wetlands, and protecting our water now and in the future. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES OF ELDER COLLEGE

Registration:

Please note — If the course is full and your name is placed on a wait list, this is an expression of interest only — it is not a registration. The wait list allows us to fill a vacancy and to determine whether the course should be offered in a subsequent semester.

Members should register for themselves whenever possible. Should a member have to be away on registration day the member can ask another member to register their class or classes for them. Only one proxy per member will be allowed. Mail course registrations will not be accepted.

<u>Course Fees</u> are based on the number of sessions and actual costs involved. We try to keep the course fees reasonable and affordable. Fees have been established by the Executive Board, in consultation with the Finance and Curriculum Committees.

<u>Cancellation Fees</u> of 10% of the course fee shall be levied to cover administrative costs if notice to cancel is given at least seven (7) days prior to the beginning of the course.

Refund - If notice of cancellation is less than seven (7) days, course fees will not be refunded

<u>Scent Free</u> – The Board of Directors of Elder College has passed a motion that, as much as possible, all of our meetings and classes should be scent free. Please do what you can to respect the needs of those members that have allergies to various scents.
